
proactive step toward enhancing the quality of service you receive.

Winter Safety & Savings

Checklist







Easy Energy Cost Savers

- Seal gaps in walls, floors, and ceilings with caulk or foam sealant. Look for cracks around windows, wires and pipes.
- Unplug electronics while you're on vacation so they don't pull electricity while in rest mode. You can check out your "Always On" energy usage under "Energy Detail" in the SmartHub app.
- Wash clothes in cold water. Use hot water only for very dirty loads.
- Set your ceiling fan to spin clockwise to draw cool air up and circulate warm air that has risen to the ceiling.

Kitchen Efficiencies

- Turn off kitchen and other exhaust fans within 20 minutes after you are done cooking.
- Clean refrigerator coils annually.
- The most efficient refrigerator temperature settings are between 34° - 37°. Ideal freezer temperature is between o° - 5°.
- Slow-cooker meals are one of the most energy-efficient ways to prepare food.
- Insulate kitchen pipes, especially near exterior walls. Seal any gaps around pipes to avoid drafts.

Decorations & Lights

- Inspect Christmas lights before use and discard any strands that are damaged or worn out.
- Keep decorations at least three feet away from heat sources, especially those with an open flame.
- Running cords under furniture or rugs and stapling cords to walls present serious fire hazards.
- Extension cords are not designed for long-term use. If you have a long-term need, consider having a qualified electrician install more outlets in your home.

Outdoor Energy & Safety

- Turn off pool pumps and heaters when not in use.
- Verify livestock water tank heaters are off when not needed.
- Add faucet covers to outdoor faucets to insulate and protect your pipes from freezing.
 - Keep generators at least 20 feet away from your home and never operate in an enclosed space. The safest way to operate a generator during an outage is to use a transfer switch. Call the coop if you are interested in having a Generlink Transfer Switch installed on your electric meter.

Heating Equipment

- Have your heating system inspected annually by a licensed, qualified professional.
- Clean or replace filters on furnaces once a month or as recommended.
- An electric space heater can cost more than \$100 per month to operate. Minimize their use, except for temporary spot heating. Turn them off when leaving the room.
- Set your water heater to the lowest point, about 120°.

Fire Safety

- With the time change, be sure to replace the batteries in your smoke detectors. No smoke detector? Contact the American Red Cross for free smoke detector installation.
- Test your smoke alarms monthly and make sure your house is protected by an adequate number of working alarms.
- Share your fire escape plan with your overnight guests. Everyone should know at least two ways out of each room in your home.
- Consider having guests with mobility issues sleep on the ground floor of your house.

Corn Casserole

INGREDIENTS

3 cans corn

1/2 stick butter

1 - 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese

1 or 2 T. chopped jalapenos salt and pepper to taste

DIRECTIONS

Cream butter and cream cheese; melt in microwave. Pour into 9x13" casserole dish. Add jalapenos. Drain corn and add to cheese mixture. Salt and pepper to taste. Mix well. Bake at 350° for 45 minutes. You can sprinkle paprika on top before serving.
